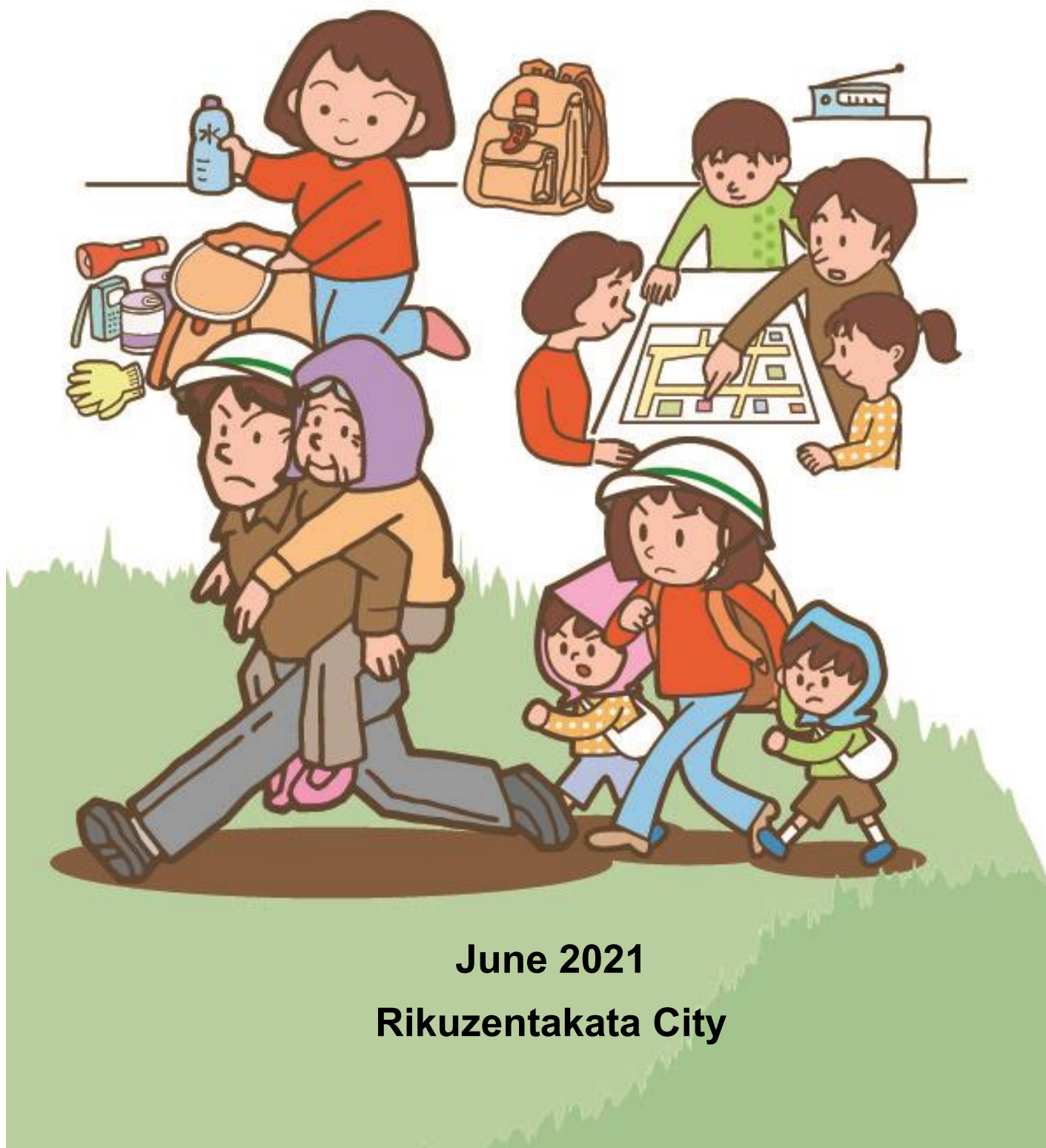

The opening of the "Rikuzentakata City Great East Japan Earthquake Analysis Report" states that **evacuation is most important** and highlights the importance of disaster prevention education and drills that focus on teaching **proactive evacuation**.

This manual is designed to help you take appropriate actions in the event of an earthquake, tsunami, flood, or landslide, and to provide you with information on how to prepare for disasters.

Additionally, there is a section for you to record your emergency supplies, emergency contact information, evacuation sites, and meeting places for your preparation. While you read this manual, think about your own evacuation plans, talk about evacuation at home and within your community, and use it to prepare for emergencies.

Lessons Learned from the “Rikuzentakata City Great East Japan Earthquake Analysis Report”

1. Evacuation Above All Else

Evacuation is the most important part of disaster preparedness to save lives. To be prepared for emergencies, **check your area for risk areas and evacuation sites, and confirm your evacuation routes regularly**. In addition, pay attention to announcements about evacuation, weather, etc., and be sure to evacuate as soon as possible.

2. Running to an Evacuation Site is Not the End

Even after evacuating, stay calm and focused. Be on the lookout for recurring tsunamis and be prepared to **evacuate to even higher ground**. Pay attention to tsunami warnings, etc., and continue evacuating until the **situation is confirmed safe**.

3. Ensuring the Safety of People with Public Roles

The top priority for disaster responders and evacuation personnel is to **ensure their personal safety**. It is crucial to pay attention to evacuation orders and weather conditions via radios, cell phones, etc., and **evacuate before imminent disaster**.

4. Developing a Safe, Disaster-Resilient Community

To reduce the damage caused by earthquakes, the city will facilitate **earthquake-proofing of homes** along with maintaining an information mass-communication system to alert citizens as quickly as possible to potential tsunami, floods, and landslide disasters.

5. Realizing an Inclusive Society

To create a society that inherently accepts differences, one that is friendly to all people, including those with disabilities, various considerations must be made to ensure that **people who require special assistance can evacuate safely**.



Designated Emergency Evacuation Sites and Shelters

(Previously known as a "secondary evacuation center")




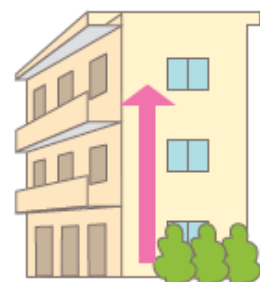
Evacuation Information

About evacuation information

In the event of an imminent disaster, the city will announce the following evacuation information through the Disaster Prevention Administrative Radio or by other means. When such information is announced, follow the instructions and start evacuating.

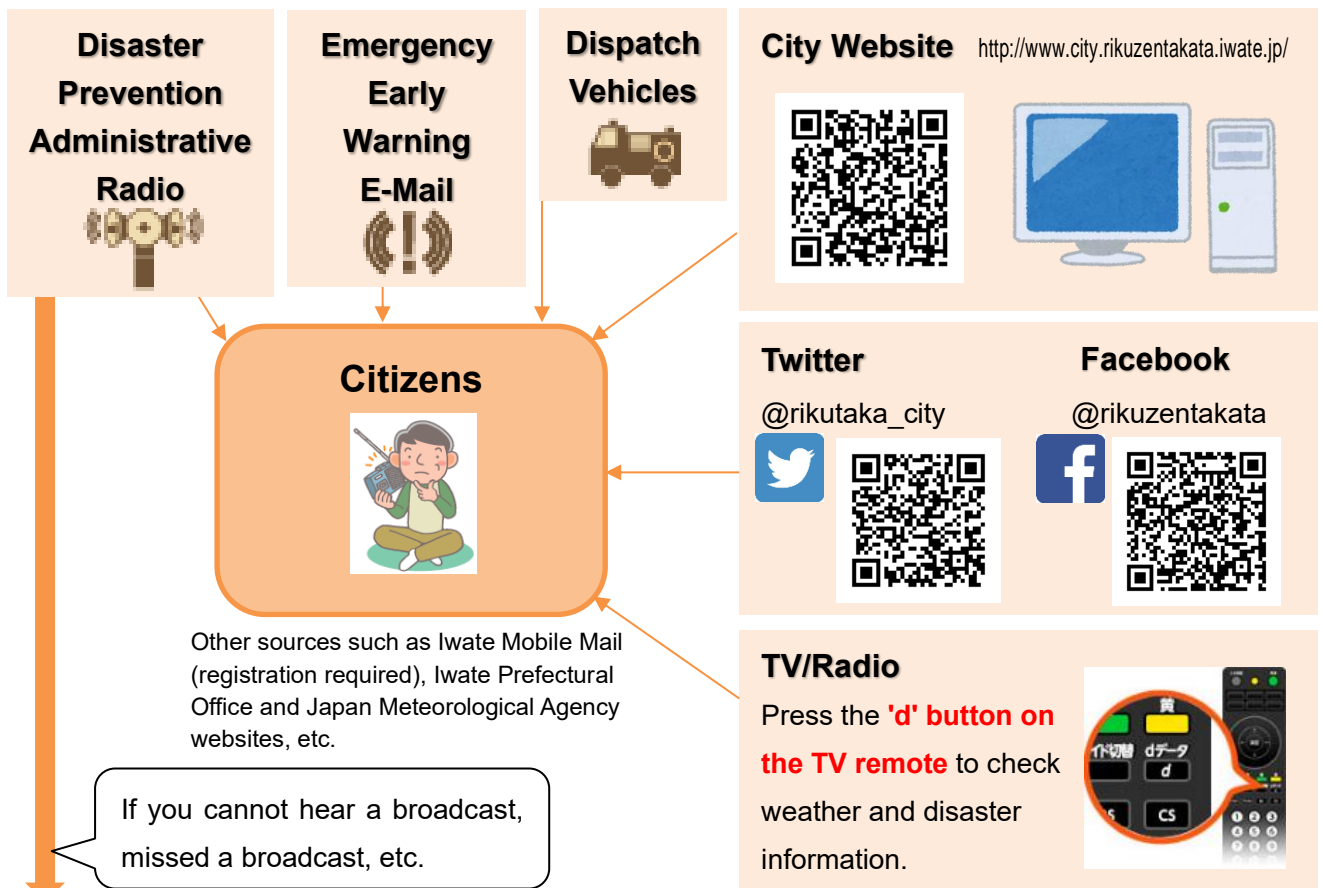
※In situations where going outside would endanger your life, **evacuate to a nearby sturdy building** or **the upper floors of your home** (vertical evacuation) to secure your safety.



# What kinds of Evacuation Information are there? Where do you get that information from?

## Obtaining information


The city communicates information about evacuation orders, weather warnings, etc. to citizens via the Disaster Prevention Administrative Radio, dispatch vehicles, and the Internet.



**Disaster Prevention Administrative Radio**  
Disaster Prevention Administrative Radio broadcasts can be checked via phone and e-mail.

**Emergency Early Warning E-Mail**

# Evacuation of People Who Require Special Assistance

~Aiming to "create a town that inherently accepts differences※"~

※The idea that all people, including those with disabilities, can live equally in society.

## Who are the people requiring special assistance

People who require special assistance during a disaster, such as the elderly, people with disabilities, and infants, are referred to as "**vulnerable people**". It may be difficult for them to evacuate on their own, so the cooperation of community members is necessary.

### Elderly

- Call out to them
- Carry them
- Lend your arm



### Wheelchairs

- 3-4 people help with stairs
- Face backwards when descending hills
- Engage the break when getting on, off, and when stopped



### Vision-Impaired

- Lend your arm
- Walk slowly and watch for uneven terrain



### Pregnant & Children

- Pay attention to their physical condition
- Carry small children



### Hearing-Impaired

- Writing
- Look at them and talk slowly



### Foreigners

- Gestures
- Plain Japanese



It is important to keep in touch with your neighbors on a regular basis and build a relationship where you can help each other in times of need.

# Preparing for Earthquakes

## When an earthquake occurs

Stay calm and cautious to prevent injuries:

### <Indoors>

#### (1) Ensure personal safety

Move away from furniture that may topple over and protect your head and body by getting under tables or other furniture. (Put out open flames only after the shaking has stopped)



#### (2) Do not rush outside

Do not rush outside of the house or building, as falling objects can cause injuries.



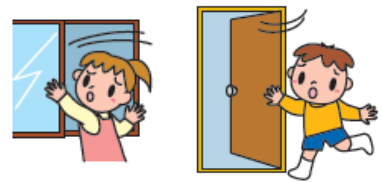
#### (3) Beware of broken glass, etc.

Wear slippers or shoes when walking indoors.



#### (4) Secure an escape route

Open windows and the front door completely.



### <Outdoors>

#### Be aware of falling objects

Watch out for falling objects such as window glass or store signs.



#### Be cautious while driving

If you stop on the side of the road and exit your car, leave the keys in the ignition and the doors unlocked.



#### Avoid fences, etc.

Stay away from brick walls and other fences that could collapse.





# How should I evacuate in the event of an earthquake?

## How should I prepare for earthquakes?

### If an Earthquake Early Warning is announced

#### Do not rush outside. Protect your head and body

When an earthquake of intensity 5 or higher is forecasted, an Earthquake Early Warning announcement will be sent out to areas where tremors of intensity 4 or higher may occur.



### Preparing for earthquakes

#### Earthquake Resistance in Homes

Earthquake resistance in homes is crucial to protect your life and property from earthquakes. Houses which were built before current earthquake resistance standards were implemented (1981) should undergo an Earthquake Resistance Inspection and be reinforced or reconstructed if necessary.

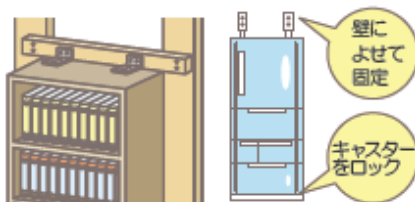


There is a **subsidy program to help with the cost of earthquake resistance inspections and renovations** for houses.

#### Affixing Furniture and Anti-Shatter Glass Measures

##### Affixing Furniture



Affix furniture to the wall with L-brackets to prevent them from tipping over. Lock refrigerator casters and secure it to the wall with a belt or other means.

##### Containment Measures

Cover shelves with non-slip material or a dish towel and install latches on cabinet doors.



##### Anti-Shatter Glass Measures

Glass surfaces should be covered with anti-shatter film to prevent shards of glass from flying outwards.



# Preparing for Tsunamis

## If you fear a tsunami is coming

### Do not wait for tsunami warnings. Evacuate immediately

- If you receive an earthquake early warning, be on the lookout for a tsunami.
- When a strong or long tremor subsides, do not wait for a tsunami warning to be issued. **Immediately move away from the sea and evacuate to higher ground.**



### Evacuate immediately to the nearest safe high ground

- **Evacuation is the most important part to saving lives.**
- Shout out to those around you "Tsunami!" and "Run!" and **take the initiative in evacuating** to safe high ground.
- Tsunamis travel up rivers, so do not flee along rivers.



### Do not assume you are safe. Evacuate to a higher area, even if it is just a little bit higher.

- Even shallow waters will wash you away.
- Do not trust past experiences, memories, or assumptions. Be on the lookout for more tsunamis and evacuate to higher ground.



### Continue evacuating until safety is confirmed, such as when tsunami warnings are lifted.

- Tsunamis strike repeatedly, and the second and third waves are sometimes larger than the first.
- Pay attention to the latest information and continue to evacuate until the tsunami advisory is lifted.
- Do not leave school / work to go home or to pick up family, friends, or pets.

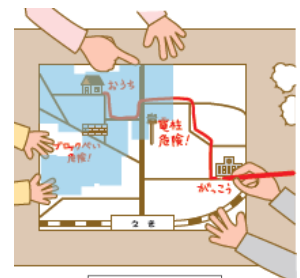
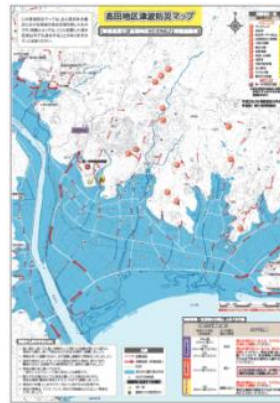
# How should I evacuate if I fear a tsunami is coming?

## How can I prepare for a tsunami?

### Preparing for a tsunami

#### Utilize Disaster Prevention Maps

Check the "Tsunami Disaster Prevention Map" (distributed by the Disaster Prevention Division) on a regular basis to confirm evacuation sites and routes.



#### Check for Tsunami Evacuation Signs

Signs directing people to tsunami evacuation sites are placed on utility poles and other locations around the city.



### Categories of tsunami warnings and appropriate actions

The actual height of a tsunami may be higher than what is estimated depending on the area.

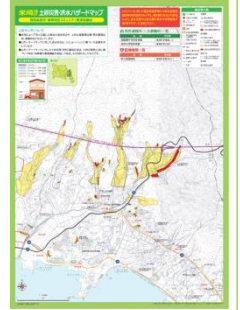

# Preparing for Floods

## Check your area for flood-risk and evacuate early

### Identify flood-risk areas in advance

Check the "Landslide and Flood Hazard Map" (available from the Disaster Prevention Division) in advance for evacuation sites, evacuation routes, and locations where flooding is likely to occur.



### Pay attention to weather and evacuation information

- Use TV (“データ放送” Option), radio, and the Internet to obtain the latest weather reports.
- The city's Disaster Prevention Administrative Radio broadcasts can be checked by phone or e-mail.
- Check to see if the city has released any evacuation orders.

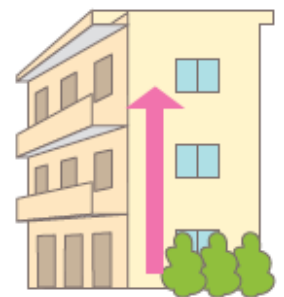
### Evacuate early

- Evacuate early before flooding occurs.
- Prepare raincoats, warm clothes, etc. to protect from rain and wind in advance.



### If the area has already flooded / is it difficult to leave

- It is very dangerous to go outside when flooding has already begun or when the strength of wind and rain are increasing during typhoons.
- Do not force yourself to evacuate. Instead, secure your safety by sheltering in a sturdy building or the upper floors of your home.



# What should I do if I feel my area has a risk of flooding? How can I prepare for floods?

## Preparing for flooding

### Watch out for these phenomena!

- Rapidly rising water levels
- Collapsing riverbanks
- Floating manhole covers
- Overflowing rivers

### Check the water level of rivers

## Effective use of weather information during heavy rainfall

In the event of heavy rain, it is important to take early action by using weather reports, and the warnings and advisories that are issued over time.

When a special warning is issued, take immediate action to protect your life.

# Preparing for Landslides

## Check your area for risk of landslides and evacuate early

### Identify landslide prone areas in advance

Check the "Landslide and Flood Hazard Map" (available from the Disaster Prevention Division) in advance for information on potential landslide hazard areas, evacuation sites, and evacuation routes.



### When it rains, pay attention to weather and evacuation information

- Use TV ("データ放送" Option), radio, and the Internet to obtain the latest weather information.
- The city's Emergency Wireless Alert System broadcasts can also be checked by phone or e-mail.
- Check to see if the city has released any evacuation orders.

### Evacuate as soon as possible

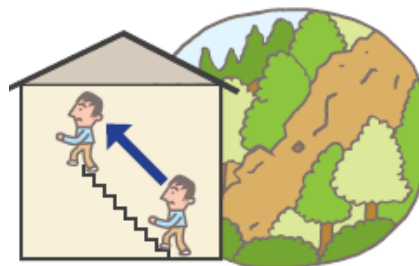
- Landslide disasters are difficult to predict. If you feel that you are in danger of a landslide, evacuate to a safe place immediately.



### If it is difficult to evacuate

#### **Rockslides**

Do not force yourself to evacuate. Ensure your safety by putting distance between you and the landslide hazard area and evacuating to a sturdy building or the upper floors of your home.



#### **Mudslides**

Evacuate as far away from dangerous flows as possible.

# What should I do if I feel my area has a risk of a landslide?

## How can I prepare for a landslide?

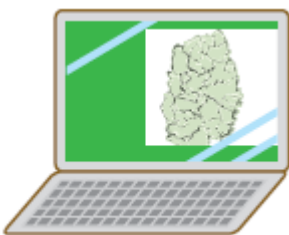
### Preparing for landslides

There are three types of landslides: rockslides, mudslides, and landslides, which are caused by earthquakes and rain. In addition, **because they occur suddenly and are very difficult to predict**, damage can occur repeatedly in the same area.



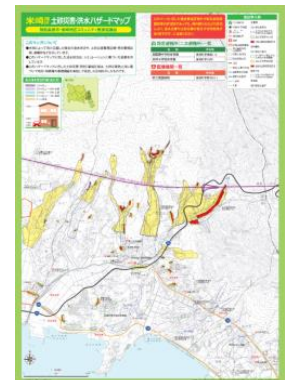
### Check for areas at risk of landslides

For more information on landslide hazard areas within the city, please visit the Iwate Prefecture website or check the "Landslide and Flood Hazard Map" (available from the Disaster Prevention Division).

Can be used to check for areas in danger of rockslides, mudslides, and landslides.



### When a landslide warning is issued

- Landslide Disaster Alerts are jointly issued by Iwate Prefecture and the Morioka District Meteorological Observatory **when there is a danger that a landslide may occur.**
- Move away from risk areas immediately.
- Pay attention to evacuation information released by the city and evacuate as soon as possible, especially from areas where there is a risk of landslide.

You can check the areas in the prefecture where landslide disaster warning information has been issued.



## Check for risk areas in advance

### Identify risk areas around your home

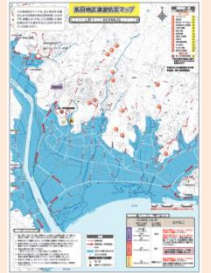
Find out what kind of disasters may occur around your home.



Check to see if the area you live in is in the inundation zone of the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami.

#### Tsunami Disaster Prevention Maps

You can check the inundation zone of the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami, as well as confirm designated tsunami emergency evacuation sites and evacuation routes.



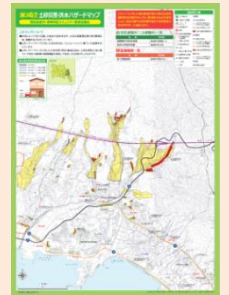
Be aware of any areas around your home that have flooded in the past.

Check to see if the area around your home is in a flood risk area, landslide risk area, etc.

※The maps on the right have been distributed to all households. Extras can be picked up at the Disaster Prevention Division of City Hall or downloaded from the city website.

#### Landslide and Flood Hazard Maps

You can check the conditions for river flooding due to heavy rain (Kesen River and Yahagi River only), (special) landslide disaster risk areas, and designated evacuation shelters.



### Confirm evacuation sites and evacuation routes

Confirm evacuation sites and multiple evacuation routes with family members.

- Confirm where to evacuate to
- Consider multiple evacuation routes
- Determine a family meeting place





## Stockpile food and drinking water



### Preparing emergency supplies

- Prepare what you need using the checklist on the back cover, and store it together in an easy to grab location.
- Prepare at least three days' worth of water and food for each person in the household.

### Rolling stock (at-home stockpile strategy)

- Stockpiling a little more of the normal foods that you use in your daily life, such as cup noodles or other long shelf-life foods, and buying more as you consume them will allow you to stockpile more efficiently.



## Consider what to wear during an evacuation

**Wear safe, comfortable clothing** to avoid injury during evacuation.

**Protective Headgear**  
Protects your head from falling objects.

**Gloves**  
Protects your hands from glass or other debris.

**Backpack**  
Put all your emergency items inside so you can free up your hands.

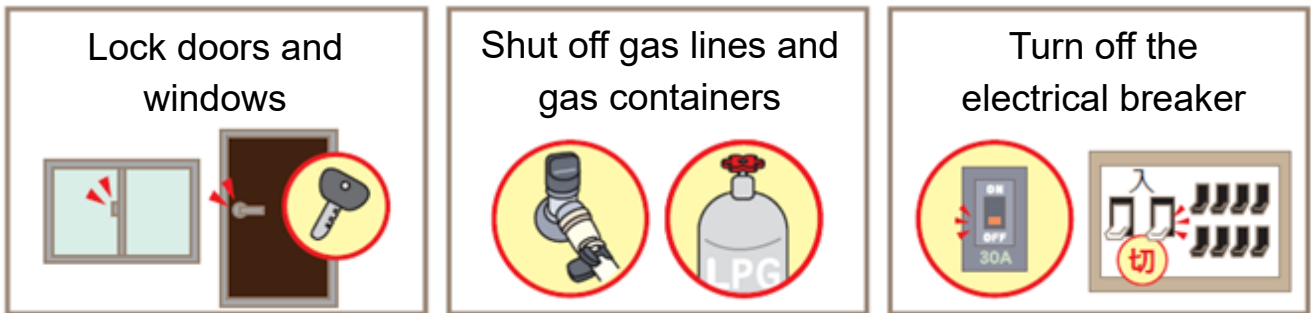
**Long Sleeves**  
Wear unrestrictive and comfortable clothes.

**Weatherproof Layer**  
Keep warm and dry when moving outdoors during bad weather.

**Proper Shoes**  
Shoes with thick soles will protect your feet.

**Nametag**  
Have small children wear a nametag.
